Liturgy of the Word

This portion of the liturgy is known as the Liturgy of the Word. It consists of Scripture readings, the sermon, the Creed, and the Prayers of the People. Anglican worship is built upon the trustworthy foundation of the Bible. We read it, pray it, and sing it. During the liturgy of the Word, we read selected lessons from the Old Testament, Psalms, New Testament, and Gospel coming from our threevear Sunday lectionary cycle. We stand for the Gospel reading to show the importance we place on Jesus' words and actions as the lens through which we read the rest of Scripture.

PSALMS

The Psalms have been the hymnbook of God's people for almost 3,000 years, and they form the backbone of our worship as the Church today. The oldest psalm, Psalm 90, was written by Moses in approximately 1500 BC. They were written to be sung, and the Church sings them in many different forms.

went. And there was an Ethiopian, a eunuch, a court official of Candace, queen of the Ethiopians, who was in charge of all her treasure. What prevents me from being baptized?" ³⁸ And he commanded the chariot to stop, and they both went down into the water, Philip and the eunuch, and he baptized him. ³⁹ And when they came up out of the water, the Spirit of the Lord carried Philip away, and the eunuch saw him no more, and went on his way rejoicing. 40 But Philip found himself at Azotus, and as he passed through he preached the gospel to all the towns until he came to Caesarea.

GOSPEL

We stand for the proclamation of the Gospel, the Good News of Jesus Christ, signifying the importance we place on Jesus' words and actions, the lens through which we read all of Scripture. We turn and face the Gospel Book as it is carried. This reminds us that Christ came to dwell among us.

NICENE CREED

We say and pray the Nicene Creed together as a trustworthy summary of the message of the Gospel and as a corporate declaration of the faith that has been handed down to us from the early Church. It was born of rigorous intellectual debate regarding the nature of the Trinity in the 4th c., culminating in councils of the whole church at Nicaea in 325AD and at Constantinople in 381AD. The word "creed" comes from the Latin word "credo" which means "I believe."

On the third day he rose again, in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven, and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end. We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son, who with the Father and the Son is worshiped and glorified, who has spoken through the prophets.

We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one Baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.

CONFIRMATION

The Anglican Church requires a public and personal profession of the Faith from every adult believer in Jesus Christ. Confirmation or **Reception** by a Bishop is its liturgical expression. Confirmation is clearly grounded in Scripture: the Apostles prayed for, and laid their hands on those who had already been baptized (2 Timothy 1:6-7; acts 8:14-17; 19:6).

In

Confirmation, through the Bishop's laying on of hands and prayer for daily increase in the Holy Spirit, God strengthens the believer for Christian life in the service of Christ and his kingdom. (continued on next page...)

CONFIRMATION, CONT.

Grace is God's gift, and we pray that he will pour out his Holy Spirit on those who have already been made his children by adoption and grace in Baptism. At the direction of the Bishop, and after public reaffirmation of their baptismal promises, those having made adult professions of faith in other Christian traditions (including those confirmed in other traditions) are received into the Anglican Church with prayer and the laying on of hands by a Bishop.

New Testaments and the Catechism of the Church. God's grace is imparted in Baptism, through which we are made God's children by adoption and given the Holy Spirit. By the power of the Spirit, manifested in gifts and fruit, we are enabled to be God's people for the sake of the world.

Now, these Candidates desire publicly to confess their faith in Jesus Christ as Savior and their commitment to follow him as Lord. They also desire the strengthening of grace through the laying on of hands, that the Holy Spirit may fill them more and more for their ministry in the Church and in the world.

FOR CONFIRMATION (BCP page 178)

Bishop: Defend, O Lord, this your servant (Name) with your heavenly grace, that *he/ she* may continue yours for ever, and daily increase in your Holy Spirit more and more until *he/she* comes into the fullness of your everlasting kingdom. *People:* **Amen.**

FOR RECEPTION (BCP page 179)

Bishop: Strengthen, O Lord, with your Holy Spirit, your servant (Name), whom we recognize as a member of the One, Holy, Catholic, and Apostolic Church, and receive into the fellowship of this Communion. Empower *him/her* for your service, and sustain *him/her* all the days of *his/her* life.






REAFFIRMATION

OFFERTORY





THE PRAYER OF CONSECRATION (BCP page 132)

Please kneel.

Celebrant:

Holy and gracious Father: In your infinite love you have made us for yourself; and when we had sinned against you and become subject to evil and death, you, in your mercy, sent your only Son Jesus Christ into the world for our salvation By the Holy Spirit and the Virgin Mary he became flesh and dwelt among us. In obedience to your will, he stretched out his arms upon the Cross and offered himself once for all, that by his suffering and death we might be saved. By his resurrection he broke the bonds of death, trampling Hell and Satan under his feet. As our great high priest, he ascended to your right hand in glory, that we might come with confidence before the throne of grace.

Prayer of Consecration

The Holy Communion, the Supper of the Lord, is not only a sign of the love that Christians ought to have among themselves for each other but is especially a sacrament of our redemption by Christ's death. The Eucharistic Prayer is centered in the atoning death of Jesus Christ upon the cross. His suffering there in our place is the only sufficient ground or basis for our standing before God. Our joy in the present and our hope for the future all flow from the reality of God's redeeming work in the historic event of the crucifixion.

The Lord's Prayer

Jesus gave this prayer to His disciples as an example of how to pray. It has been part of Eucharistic liturgies since the 4th c.

In the Lord's Prayer, we ask for daily bread, or the things we need to get through each day, but we also ask our Lord to give us of Himself, the true Bread of Life. On the night that he was betrayed, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks, he broke it and gave it to his disciples, saying, "Take, eat; this is my Body, which is given for you: Do this in remembrance of me."

Likewise, after supper, Jesus took the cup, and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, saying, "Drink this, all of you; for this is my Blood of the New Covenant, which is shed for you, and for many, for the forgiveness of sins: Whenever you drink it, do this in remembrance of me."

Therefore we proclaim the mystery of faith: *Celebrant and People:*

Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again.

Celebrant:

We celebrate the memorial of our redemption, O Father, in this sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving, and we offer you these gifts. Sanctify them by your Word and Holy Spirit to be for your people the Body and Blood of your Son Jesus Christ. Sanctify us also, that we may worthily receive this holy Sacrament, and be made one body with him, that he may dwell in us and we in him. In the fullness of time, put all things in subjection under your Christ, and bring us with all your saints into the joy of your heavenly kingdom, where we shall see our Lord face to face.



Prayer of Humble Access

The Prayer of Humble Access is a distinctive element of worship in the Anglican Tradition. Assembled by Thomas Cranmer, it includes phrases and concepts from Mark 7:28, the Liturgy of St. Basil, a Gregorian collect, John 6:56, and the theology of Martin Luther and Thomas Aquinas.

Agnus Dei

The Agnus Dei is based on John 1:29 and is the Fraction Anthem most traditionally used in the Western Church.

Communion Songs

We encourage you to continue to pray by singing both before and after Communion. In this way all of us are helping each other to lift our hearts continuously in the midst of receiving the greatest gift ever given: the life of Jesus Christ.

Post Communion Prayer


After Communion, the Celebrant says: Let us pray.
