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RECTOR'S ANNUAL REPORT

Dear Saint Luke's Family,

It's been more than two years since Liza and I responded to the Saint Luke's Rector Search committee's call for applications, and ever since I submitted my cover letter, the Lord has strengthened and confirmed that call every step of the way. As I reflect on this past year with an eye to the future, it's with humble gratitude to you all and grateful praise to the Lord because leadership transitions can be challenging. While certain aspects of this past year were not easy, I'm excited about what we've done, where we're going, and most importantly, who we are. I've been overwhelmed by the gentle, gracious, and joyful way this transition has been navigated. We had hoped this would be the case, and we haven't been let down; thanks be to God!



As I prepared this report last year. I had only been your Rector for five months. We had just celebrated our first Epiphany bonfire, we were in the middle of a liturgical transition to the 2019 Anglican Book of Common Prayer, we were searching for an Associate Rector and youth minister, we were bringing back Wednesday night dinners and Bible study, we had plans for a Lenten Lunch Speaking Series, and— you were just getting used to my preaching, teaching, and sense of humor (still waiting for some of you!) Through it all, here we are, with all of these things realized, and we're looking forward with excitement to the future. Through a continued emphasis on worship, discipleship, and evangelism, we will continue our mission "To Know Christ and Make Him Known" and we'll watch how the Lord will continue to bless our endeavors here on Hilton Head Island.

Worship

This past year, we observed the retirement of our beloved Deacon, The Revd. Kathie Phillips. The wisdom, guidance, and continuity she provided were invaluable during this crucial transition year, and we thank God for Kathie, Bill, and their loving (and continued) service to Saint Luke's! Although Kathie's departure was bittersweet, we've been incredibly blessed by the addition of The. Ven. Dr. Kelly O'Lear and his family—they were well worth the wait! Fr. Kelly has brought a wealth of experience, pastoral insight, wisdom, and joy to us here on the staff and in the congregation. In addition to the O'Lears, we welcomed Patrick Wieber and his family to the staff, and he's done an excellent job resetting and laying the groundwork for our youth program here at Saint Luke's. In addition to staff, we've been worshipping with the 2019 ABCP for over a year, and the liturgy's richness, theological depth, and beauty continue to enlighten and enrich; thanks be to God!

Discipleship

In addition to discipleship for children between the services, this past year saw the continued growth of and interest in the Rector's forum discipleship offering for high schoolers and adults, which has been a great joy! Also, with the help of our fantastic staff and generous volunteers, our seasonal church-wide Bible studies have been very well received. Beginning this past Epiphany with our "Pizziphany," we will, as a church have studied the books of Galatians and Romans, and we'll keep it going, so stay tuned! In addition to the Bible Studies, thanks to our staff and volunteers, we enjoyed the first annual Lenten and Advent Speaker Series here and look forward to continuing these new

seasonal traditions. Through it all, our promise to you is that we here at Saint Luke's will do everything we can to help you "grow in the grace and knowledge of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ" (2 Peter 3:18) because with that growth comes an increased trust in the promises of God for you; amen and amen!

Evangelism

In many ways, evangelism is simply the expected fruit of the aforementioned growth. As we share our lives with one another, it is impossible to hide what we genuinely care about and where we find our hope. But you all know this! As I mentioned from the outset, throughout the new initiatives, changes, and challenges, that we've walked this past year, we've done so with grace, charity, and joy, as a church should—and that has made all the difference. I thought this would be the case, and that has been proven repeatedly, for which we are deeply grateful, humbled, and blessed.

In Conclusion

In my cover letter to the Rector Search committee, I wrote a paragraph that has been proven accurate time and time again, and I thought I'd end with a snippet for your edification.

With respect to Saint Luke's, I am humbled by the prospect of assuming the leadership of a church with such a long and faithful history. Although I have only been a part of the ACNA for the past three years, I have been watching the courage and convictions unfold in this diocese and beyond since my time as a fellow at the Falls Church some 22 years ago now, and it has been inspiring and edifying to see people count the true cost of discipleship in an increasingly hostile world. To that end, were I to be called to Saint Luke's, my emphasis would remain on equipping people of all ages to "defend the hope they have" (1 Peter 3:16) by engaging the exact places the culture is pushing back on biblical truth and Gospel witness. I say this not only as a pastor

endeavoring to heed Jesus' command to "feed my sheep" but also as a son, a husband, a father, and a fellow disciple seeking to be more fully conformed to the image of Jesus (Romans 8:29). In many ways, this vision of ministry that informs my life dovetails nicely with the parish's mission statement "To Know Christ and Make Him Known.

Saint Luke's truly is a church that seeks to fulfill that mission and embody what the vision statement claims, namely, that we are, "a family of believers who are growing in the love of Jesus, sharing the joy of worship, and serving our community and beyond," and Liza and I are overjoyed to be a part of what the Lord is doing here on Hilton Head Island, thanks be to God!



ASSOCIATE RECTOR'S ANNUAL REPORT

Our family wants to thank the congregation of Saint Luke's for a warm and generous welcome. Our reception was beyond our expectations.

Since arriving, I have:

- Taken regular Sunday and Wednesday preaching and celebrant opportunities. I preach on a one-week-on, two-week-off cycle and celebrate each Sunday and alternate Wednesdays.
- Led the Rector's Forum as well as our Romans Study.
- Collaborated with both Mrs. Rodman and Mr. Reese on the music program. This effort is to thoughtfully and collegially align our music choices with the Sunday texts.
- Retrained/trained our Lay Eucharistic Ministers (LEM). Our numbers have increased, and we have built a more excellent rapport with our local facilities.
- Participated in acolyte training. My children were added as acolytes.
- Began serving as Chaplain to the Daughters of the Holy Cross. I open most sessions and offer teaching upon request.
- Began serving on the Grants Committee of the Church Mouse. I am thrilled to assist in serving ministries rooted in the Lowcountry.
- Conducted new home and Epiphany home blessings. This has been an excellent opportunity for Jen and me to get to know our people.
- Began implementation of the Diocesan Child and Youth Protection Policy. This must be completed by October 2024.
- Been assigned to the Diocesan Committee on Ministry. I attended one retreat to evaluate six candidates for Holy Orders.
- Coordinated with the White Rose Sisterhood in supporting new widows in addition to teaching about grief.
- Represented Saint Luke's at the clergy gatherings and the clergy retreat.
- Instituted a weekly clergy gathering for Saint Luke's ministers to build team cohesion.
- Continued my service to the Archbishop on the Consortium for Seminary Standards.
- Continued to provide leadership to the Jurisdiction of the Armed Forces and Chaplaincy in leading the Education, Training, and Formation Directorate. I will officially step down from this position on March 1, 2024.
- Continued as adjunct faculty at Nashotah House Theological Seminary, teaching the Certificate in Anglican Ministry program.

Again, thank you for the warm welcome and willingness to incorporate me quickly and openly into the work our Lord is doing at Saint Luke's.



DEACON'S ANNUAL REPORT

It's such an incredible blessing to have served our Saint Luke's family as Deacon. The years have flown by and God has blessed me so much more than I ever imagined. It's been my privilege to serve at Sunday services, the Wednesday Eucharist and at many memorials, funerals and interments. A deacon is under the Bishop and he in turn assigns the deacons to specific churches under the Rector of that church. The work of a deacon, in our diocese, is a nonstipendiary position (no paycheck). This year marked a momentous milestone for me. September 10 was the 18th anniversary of my ordination and September 10, 2023 was the day of my retirement and the church feted me with a wonderful celebration...more than I could've ever imagined! Thank you all so much!



On October 4, 2023, I started a new adventure with what the Navy doctors at the Iwakuni, Japan base thought was a huge floater that was attached to my retina. When we arrived home in November, I saw my eye doctor, who had the same diagnosis. He sent me to a retina specialist. Much to my surprise, he diagnosed wet macular degeneration. At that same appointment he started treatments, which I shall have every 4 to 6 weeks. This has made it almost impossible for me to hand write and it's even difficult using my iPad, so please forgive me for not writing thank you notes for all the gifts of love. It took me forever to write only 4 thank you notes and I threw away 6 that were full of mistakes before I got those 4 done! I love you all and it has been one of the greatest joys in my life to serve you all here at Saint Luke's.

Several times a year there are clergy conferences and meetings, continuing education programs and meetings with the Bishop and his deacons. This past year we met at the Cathedral of St. Luke and St. Paul for our meeting with Bishop Chip with lunch at his home.

At Saint Luke's I'm an active member of the Outreach Committee, the Missions Committee and the Intercessors, which meets Wednesdays at 11:00 AM. Additionally, I served as the Chaplain of the newly instituted Daughters of the Holy Cross.

It's also a great blessing to be involved in annual trips to Jericho Ministry and to watch how God has grown the women and children to whom they minister. It continues to be an unmeasurable blessing to be on the WhatsApp Jericho prayer team. We pray for the needs of the beautiful children who live at Jericho Villas, for Betsy Hake, the founder and director, and for Elvia Forgas, who is the director of The

Villa, where the girls live. Because we return year after year (23+ years now) the relationships we've built continue to grow and blossom and we've become family.

My heart will always be with our Saint Luke's family and it's been an incredible joy to serve you. Serving for over 25 years with Greg was such a blessing, and it's equally a joy to serve with our new Rector, Jady Koch. Getting to know their family has been a joy and it's wonderful to see our Saint Luke's family continue to thrive!

• We've continued








had over 60 children participate, plus we had many youth and adult volunteers. It was a great week filled with so many blessings!

Another year to serve God. What an AWE-SOME responsibility God has given us to teach young children about HIM. We are an extension of the family.

There are some of our children who do not go to church. Saint Luke's Preschool may be the only place they hear about the Gospel of Jesus Christ. May we continue to be faithful in proclaiming HIS truths every day.

A Recap of 2023:

- God has blessed us with 15 full time staff and 7 part time staff.
- Currently we have 100 students enrolled in our preschool program with a wait list.
- The ages of our students range from 18 months to 5 years old in our preschool program and many stay for aftercare.
- In addition to our preschool aftercare program there is an older aftercare program where there are 27 Kindergarten – Third graders who come from





the public school.

• Our focus has always been God centered with Bible being taught everyday and Chapel once a week.

• A Christian based curriculum is used as a guideline for all our classes. This is integrated into

the activities, hands on experiences and crafts to help enhance the children's opportunities in learning.

- Our program also has extracurricular learning, Music, Art, Library, Spanish and Serbian.
- There are 3 performances each year. A Christmas program, Musical and our 5year-old graduation.
- The children who graduated this past year are doing well in kindergarten academically and emotionally.

STUDENT MINISTRY: "FELLOWSHIP"



It was this time last year that Jady called me to be the **Curate for Students and Family** here at Saint Luke's. Daily, I give thanks to the Lord, that he brought us to this church and to be a part of such a wonderful staff. As I reflect on the past six months in my role, it's incredible to see God's gracious hand over our church and the ministries within it.

Shortly after arriving, I began by restructuring and casting a long-term vision for the Student Ministry, now called **"FELLOWSHIP".**

Upon presenting the future at our **"SCOOP!"** event, both myself, Jady and our volunteers got to work quickly in ministering to the students of our church.

This past fall semester at our weekly youth

group, we walked through a series titled **"Gospel Foundations"**. We spent time gleaning what the Gospel is from passages in both the Old and New Testaments. It was enriching for not only for our students that already believe in Jesus Christ as their Lord and Savior, but also for those that are on a journey toward the Cross.

As the new school year began, we also started a new initiative with the students called **"Breakfast Club".** This is a weekly gathering of our students at a local coffee shop where we

have fellowship with them and pray over them before they head off to school. Breakfast Club's purpose is for our students to come together outside of the church campus and to grow in their relationship with each other and the Lord.

In addition, during the Fall semester, our Students attended both Diocesan retreats for Middle School Students (MONDO) and High School Students (REGENERATE) at Camp Bob Cooper in Summerton, SC. It was at these retreats where both my wife, Danielle, and I had a chance to answer many questions of faith that our students wrestle with, while also having meaningful conversations about what it means to be a Christian in our day and age.

Furthermore, the upcoming Spring semester, we'll be walking through 1, 2 and 3 John in a series titled **"Letters of John".** During this series, we'll reflect on the love that God has for us and how we're to live as Christians in modern times. We'll also attend an additional Diocesan retreat in Beaufort, SC with churches from our Deanery. Currently, we're in the process of planning a summertime domestic mission trip for our students.

I'm unable to express my **gratitude** for how our church has kept the Student Ministry as a whole in their prayers and bathed us in the love of Christ. **I'd like to thank all of the volun-teers** that have assisted me in ministering to our students week-in and week-out, including those who've cooked meals for our students through MealTrain.com. ST. LUKE'S FOUNDATION

This past year has turned out to be one of the best years for the Foundation, both in investment return and giving. Our investment return was 17% – the largest return we have ever experienced. Credit for this goes to John Wigington, our financial advisor who oversees our investments.

Our giving was also at a record high—approximately \$71,000 was given to a number of organizations and individuals. Our largest donation was to the Bishop for his home in Charleston. Betsy Hake's Jericho Ministries received \$26,000 for a truck. The Jennifer Mason Memorial Scholarship received \$10,000. Two scholarships were granted from the Foundation in total of \$2,000. Finally, the Esther Project received \$3,000 for their charitable giving.

All our capital funds continue to be managed by Wells Fargo Advisors under the guidance of John Wigington. The Foundation Board continues to provide the boundaries and goals of those investments.

Bill Phillips continues as our secretary/treasurer. Forrest Frank, Jennifer Thompson, Mark King and I make up the remainder of the Board and Bev Conner continues as our recording secretary.

SAINT LUKE'S BOOKSHOP



The Bookshop is focused on updating reading materials and reorganization. The Bookshop carries wonderful Christian literature, devotionals, children's books, Bibles, and more.



THE ESTHER PROJECT

ESTHER Project Mission Statement 2023

Mission Statement: To assist members of the Saint Luke's family who are in financial need "at such a time as this" (Esther 4:14), thus sharing our love of Christ by helping those within our church family carry their burdens. (Gal. 6:2)

The Esther Project was established in 2010 "for such a time as this" assuring that children in



need would receive Christmas gifts. Over the years, The Esther Project expanded to serve those within the Saint Luke's community who are struggling to meet some of the basic needs of life due to financial stress caused by illnesses, job loss or other unexpected expenses. Throughout the year we are able to distribute gas or food cards to help meet urgent needs, as well as help pay with housing or medical bills. Through the Preschool Director, Janice Ring, families at the school have also applied and received tuition assistance to help defray the costs of this invaluable education.

Generous donations from Saint Luke's parishioners and grants from The Church Mouse, as well as a trust from a grateful parishioner, have supported The Esther Project. God has always provided for our needs.

Requests are submitted by Saint Luke's Clergy and Staff, the Preschool Director, and occasionally by other parishioners. Donations are welcome at any time. Checks can be written to Saint Luke's Church, with "Esther Project" in the memo line and placed in the offering plate or brought to the Church Office. All requests are prayerfully considered by The Esther Project board, that consists of Janis Schluchterer, Jennifer Thompson, Frances Worthy and Judy Pugatch. Recipients of our charitable giving are held in strict confidentiality.

The Esther Project is dedicated to helping those within our church family. As Paul says in Galatians 2:6, "Carry each other's burdens, and in this way you will fulfill the Law of Christ."
